HIS SUNDAY'S LITURGY offers us a fundamental teaching: the necessity to pray always, and without repining. Sometimes we grow tired of prayer; we take the view prayer is not useful for life, that it is not effective. Thus, we are tempted to dedi-

cate ourselves to activity, to employ every human method to accomplish our goals; and we neglect God. But Jesus says we must pray always, and he does this through a specific parable. (cf. Luke 18:1-8)

This parable speaks of a judge who does not fear God and who respects no one; a judge with a negative attitude, who pursues only his own interests. He does not fear God's judgment; he does not respect his neighbor. The other figure is a widow, someone who is weak. In the Bible, widows and orphans are the most needy, because the most defenseless and without means. The widow goes to the judge and asks for justice. Her prospects of being heeded are almost non-existent; the judge despises her and she cannot pressure him. She cannot even appeal to religious principles because he does not fear God. She seems deprived of all recourse. But she persists; she does not tire; she harasses the judge, and so, in the end, succeeds in obtaining what she desires. Here, using an a fortiori argument, Jesus reflects: if a dishonest judge may allow himself to be convinced by the entreaties of a widow, how much more will God, who is Good, listen to those who beseech Him. God in fact is generosity personified; He is merciful; is always disposed to listen to those who beseech Him in prayer. Hence, we must never give up hope; we must always persist in prayer.

The conclusion of the Gospel passage speaks of faith: When the Son of Man comes, will he find any faith left on earth? (Luke 18:8). Our Lord intends the question to awaken a growth of faith in us. It is clear, in fact, that prayer must be an expression of faith, else it would not be true prayer. If one does not believe in the goodness of God, he cannot pray adequately. Faith is the basis of prayer.
